Rebekah's Remarks

Dear Fine People,

We think about the 4th of July and we think about all sorts

of things. I had a friend in college who was born on the 4th of July. She actually believed that the fire works display each year was put together in her honor. Some people see the celebration as a good time to recall the sacrifices made by the founding fathers and mothers back in Revolutionary days. Then there are the parades; the family gatherings; the church family cover-dish gathering. When our family took a biking vacation of Civil War Battle Fields back in 1996, we went to Vicksburg, Mississippi and learned that the city fell to the Union troops on July 4, 1863. That city refused to acknowledge the 4th of July as a national holiday up until the 1930s. That's pretty pitiful. I think that the majority of Americans, despite all the bells and whistles of the celebration, recall our *freedom* as a nation. As I contemplate our freedom, the word that keeps coming back to my mind are the words of Christ from **John 8:31-32**:

"Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, 'If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free.'"

The truth will make you free. This is why we call it the "free press." We, the people, get the truth from our news papers... and just in case, we get the truth from different perspectives. This is why it is such a scandal when those in the media are discovered to be fabricating stories. Part of our freedom as a nation is to have access to the *truth*. It is a betrayal of our trust, and of our freedom when the so-called truth is discovered to be a lie. In

our court system, when we take the witness stand, we are asked, "*Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth... so help you God.*" Again, when it is discovered that a "*cover-up*," a perjured witness, an under the table "*deal*" is revealed, we are appalled, because without the truth, we are not free.

Poor Pontius Pilate, at Jesus' mock trial, asked Jesus, "*What is truth?*" Jesus was silent, I believe because Pilate was face-to-face *with* the Truth, and was refusing to acknowledge it. Jesus had just told his disciples, "*I am the way, the truth and the life.*" In Pilate's defense, the disciples were just as guilty as he was. They practically lived with the Truth, and they didn't recognize Him, either.

"*The truth will make you free.*" This statement confronts us, especially when Jesus is the one doing the confronting. One of my exercises in prayer is taking a cup of coffee outside to enjoy on my garden bench in the back garden. It's a pretty peaceful place, except when the golfers miss their putts. Anyway, I envision sharing that cup of coffee with Jesus. I have conversational prayer, usually in my thoughts, and we discuss the day ahead of me, and I mention people by name, who I have concerns for, or who have blessed me in unexpected ways. I strive to be very honest about how I feel about relationships... and this is where the conversation gets interesting. God *will* touch the **open** mind. He confronts me with my thoughts. He challenges my assumptions. He expands my thinking. He addresses my assumptions, and He even accuses me of hypocrisy at times. Accusations that have been cast my way, He allows me to assess in the light of His truth. Sometimes those accusations are true. Sometimes they're hair-brained.

Either way, I come away with a greater sense of who I am, and usually with a lighter burden of worry and uncertainty... because I have shared "*it*" (*whatever "it" may be*), with God. Confession is a wonderful freeing experience, and God will replace the sin with freedom from the lies we often create in order to protect ourselves.

What do we try to protect ourselves from? Why are we so afraid of the truth? Is it because we fear others will think less of us? Is it because we are afraid that in acknowledging our shortcomings, we would think less of ourselves than we already do... or we'd have to give "*it*" up, and we don't know if we are strong enough? The bottom line is the promise of Christ... The truth will make you free, and you will walk away wondering why you didn't face the truth sooner. Imagine being free from your fears; your anger; your personal lies; your denial of addictions.

This summer, I encourage all of us to take a cup of coffee to whatever equivalent of a garden bench you have, and bring the presence of Jesus into your prayer life. Remember one of my favorite quotes from Richard Foster, "*If you don't want to change, don't pray.*" Pray your heart out. The truth will free you, and you will have a closer walk with Jesus, who is "*the Way, the Truth, and our very Lives.*"

Be faithful in worship. Invite a friend to join you. Read your *Happenings* and pray for your church family. We are blessed beyond measure.

TOM'S

Dear Friends,

As I sit and write this today, we are baking. . . literally. The thermometer on my car read 100 degrees. Hot. Even for Florida. Most of what makes our particular area feel so warm is the humidity this time of year, but the temperature rarely gets above 93 degrees. While we are struggling to stay out of the heat, our newest addition would rather just sit outside. For Liam, the weather outside is more womb-like than the dry, 77 degrees we keep our house at right now. Being comfortable in this world is no easy task.

It's on days like these that I try to think of the most discomfort I've ever felt—at least, environmentally. Few of us like to be wet for long periods of time, especially if we're wearing wet clothes. We don't like to be dirty, or swatting mosquitoes, or wiping sweat out of our eyes. If you are a camper (and I have camped, though it's not my favorite environment), you are used to being 'one' with the earth and putting aside the hygienically-accepted practices for a few days. The longest I probably went without a shower was on one of my trips in Africa. We spent two weeks in a village with no electricity or running water or much of anything, really. I remember one of our team members squashing a scorpion in the

middle of one of our evening devotions. We were in an unfamiliar world.

The one thing that often makes us comfortable, though, is water. It's ironic that we don't like water when it gets us wet outside or fills the air so much that we have trouble breathing easily, but water brings us cleansing when we bathe, shower, or wash our clothing. It rids us of germs, it makes things almost new again. It's no surprise that this element is used to remind us of God's cleansing of our lives symbolically as we think about baptism. Washing away our sins is part of how God wants us to understand forgiveness. No longer dirty, no longer uncomfortable, no longer imperfect.

Water is becoming one of the most prized resources in the world. Though our attention is often turned towards the amount of oil in the world as a resource (because we use more of it than most of the rest of the world), we take our abundance of water for granted. And it gets our attention when it's not present. If it weren't for a very full week of rain not long ago, our water tables here in Florida would still be at their lowest in years, causing the restrictions to tighten and our priorities to straighten a bit more. If it

came down to watering our lawn or taking a shower, we would probably sacrifice the lawn. If it came down to washing the car or doing our laundry, we would let the car go awhile longer. Some economists have speculated that the resource of water may be the future source of world conflicts. Few people in the world have adequate fresh water to live, meaning that disease and famine often go hand in hand. Absence of this precious resource brings death—simple as that.

In scripture, water is often equated with life. We don't often realize how much we appreciate water until we don't have it. Likewise, we don't often appreciate life until it is threatened or failing. And when it comes to eternal life, our minds are not on it if the present life is doing just fine. But we must take time to think about our future—the life that awaits us; our use of resources so that there are some left down the road; and how God has a plan for our lives that is waiting to be fulfilled. I pray that as you simmer through the summer, you'll remember the value of water, the immeasurable gift of life, and all that God wants to see fulfilled in you.

The Nominating Committee invites your recommendations of persons, and your references to

the suggested person's qualifications, so that the Nominating Committee may have as much information as possible as they seek those who are called to serve. All recommendations must be for people of faith, who love the Lord and who practice their discipleship in every avenue of their lives... tinged with humility and an eagerness to be a part of the leadership of First Presbyterian for this time in our life together. Elders need organizational skills and know how to follow a calendar of events. Elders are leaders who work with others to share the ministry and mission of the church.

Suggestions for Discipleship (2):

Elders on Discipleship and Nurture love people (specifically children, youth and adults respectably) and love teaching/learning about the Bible. Their own personal witness will show that they take the Bible seriously, and practice their faith with love and encouragement. Teaching the faith does not require a degree in education. It does require a desire to know God more fully in their own life journey, as well as a desire to teach others how to grow in their faith. Often, one of the Elders serving on the Discipleship ministry team is a qualified Youth member.

Suggestions for Finance Elder (1)

An Elder of finance is one who allows their faith to guide their finances (personal and business). Their own financial witness will reflect their love and trust of God, generosity, and a spiritual understanding of financial stewardship.

Suggestions for Personnel Elder (1)

An Elder for Personnel, besides having obvious listening skills and policy development abilities, will be one who can assess current staffing needs and relationships. They must have a deep love for Christ that is reflected in their relationships with people of varied personality types.

Suggestions for Mission Elder (1):

A Mission Elder is one who has an affinity for "the least" of those in the community and world. They are those, who in their practice of faith, draw others into spreading the gospel through over-and-above-giving; projects; and hands-on participation in "living" the life of Christ, and spreading the Word of salvation. This person must work well with people of many different opinions and personalities.

Suggestions for Worship Elder (1)

A Worship Elder is one who knows the value of quality worship which enables all of us to come into the presence of the Lord in a manner that will draw us closer to God. This ministry oversees worship details; information; devotional application of our lives; music and drama ministry.

Suggestion for Communications Elder (1)

At the annual meeting of the congregation this past February, the congregation voted to increase the number of Elders on the Session by one Elder, for a total of 19 serving Elders. We live in an era that is rapidly changing because of the varied manners of communication. Jesus told us to "Go into all the world and make disciples..." In our world, we need to tell the Good News in a way that it can be heard. This new focus will evolve as our church continues to examine the many venues and methods of sharing the Word, ministry and mission of First Presbyterian.
